

NEW GYM PROGRAM GETS KIDS TO POWER OFF AND SWITCH ON

A new program being offered at SWITCH 24-hour Gym is designed to get kids off their screens and into the gym to improve their physical and emotional wellbeing.

Power Off and SWITCH On! is aimed at young people aged 13-16 years. Qualified fitness instructors will supervise the program on the gym floor and allow participants the freedom to try different workouts and exercise equipment.

Staff from SWITCH 24-hour Gym at Goonellabah Sports & Aquatic Centre developed the program following a staff meeting where parents voiced their frustration at the increased screen time and lack of physical activity in the lives of their teenagers.

"We wanted to provide a supervised environment where young people can socialise and bond over exercise, and also try different equipment and activities to see what works for them and what they enjoy," Gym Manager Roberta O'Brien said.

"Young people are becoming increasingly sedentary but we know from experience that group activities work and young people soon get involved and engaged in what they are doing.

"For kids who don't necessarily have a sporting code they are part of, this is a great way to join a team and have fun, without the need for any specific skills or athletic talent.

"The idea of *Power Off and SWITCH On!* is to get young people doing some much-needed exercise and help reduce anxiety, boost confidence and wellbeing, and promote active living as young teenagers become young adults."

The *Power Off and SWITCH On!* program includes a one-on-one assessment, development of a

specialised program that can be changed to suit the young person, and supervision/monitoring by qualified staff.

Power Off and SWITCH On! will be held three times per week: Tuesday and Thursday from 3.30pm–5.30pm and Saturday from 9am–11am.

COUNCIL DECIDES...

At the 9 October ordinary meeting, Council decisions included the following:

On Public Exhibition – Busking Permit Fees

Council resolved (unanimous with two absent) to place on public exhibition for 28 days proposed changes to busking permit fees as stated within Council's adopted Fees and Charges.

The proposed change is to amend the current permit application fee of \$60 for a 12-month approval period to \$50 for a two-year approval period. The proposal will also introduce an interim permit approval (valid for 21 days) to enable busking to take place while the formal application is being processed.

Following the exhibition period and upon adoption by Council the amended permit framework will be applied retrospectively to applications approved by Council from 1 July 2018.

KEEN STREET FOOTPATH UPGRADE IN 2019

We will be upgrading footpaths on both sides of Keen Street (between Magellan and Woodlark Streets) from early January.

The project will involve pulling out the current concrete footpath and laying down new services and then replacing with pavers, similar to those on the Woodlark Street crossing.

Council had previously planned to fix several footpaths around the CBD block, but has now made the decision to fix both sides of Keen Street as this is becoming a major thoroughfare in Lismore with people visiting the new Lismore Regional Gallery and The Quad.

Will the footpaths be closed?

No, there will be pedestrian access to both sides of Keen Street while work is being completed. The work will be completed in stages to minimise disruptions.


How will businesses/shopping be impacted?

DISPOSE OF HOUSEHOLD PROBLEM WASTE FOR FREE

The Lismore Community Recycling Centre is open year-round so people can dispose of paint, gas bottles and fire extinguishers, oil, batteries and fluoro lights.

Drop-off is free for household quantities with a maximum 20kg/20-litre limit for each material. People can bring a maximum of 15 household fluoro lights after which a fee applies. Fees also apply for commercial items or quantities.

"Most people have these problem waste items stored in their garages or homes... they can pose a danger to household members and the environment as they start to age and breakdown and need to be disposed of appropriately," North East Waste's Community Recycling Centre Project Coordinator Karen Rudkin said.

"Paint is the most common item dropped off at the centres. It's either sold on at the tip shop for reuse or collected, mixed with other waste solvents and used as an alternative to fuel in cement kilns. The metal paint containers are then recycled. This is just one example of how the centre provides a long-term solution for disposing of problem waste and helps improve recycling and reuse rates."

Lismore has the following cultural relationships with other cities around the world:

- Sister city relationship with Yamato Takada, Japan. Commenced 7 August 1963 and was the first sister city relationship forged between Australia and Japan.
- Twin relationship with Makassar, Indonesia. Commenced 18 September 1981.
- Mutual Friendship Declaration with Conegliano and Vittorio Veneto, Italy.
 Commenced 10 June 1991.
- Sister city relationship with Lismore, Ireland. Commenced 31 October 2000.
- Sister city relationship with Eau Claire, USA. Commenced 23 January 2001.

Members of the Sister City Advisory Panel meet once a month and are committed to ensuring these relationships continue to grow and develop.

"Lismore's sister city and cultural relationships have grown organically over the years," Panel Chairperson and Councillor Neil Marks said.

"Our sister city relationship with Yamato Takada was historically significant, being the first of its kind between Australia and Japan, and this has remained a very strong bond that we actively nurture.

"With others we still share a close connection – we have a Friendship Festival each year in Lismore that celebrates our friendship with Conegliano and Vittorio Veneto in Italy, and if you visited Eau Claire in Wisconsin, you'd find the Lismore Hotel with its *Northern Star* wallpaper.

"We are looking for people to join the Sister City Advisory Panel who understand the importance of these cultural relationships and who can bring energy and creativity to the table."
